This design project was based off of the work of Aly Dodd's postcards, incorporating the qualities of pop art. Using hand-drawn images, and Photoshop to digitally edit them, a series of 6 postcards was created. These directly follow political opposition to the USA's Conservative preamble. Each postcard represents a belief I have, significant to liberal viewpoints, commonly seen at Reagan. This piece was made with the intention of people being able to take away from it (literally and figuratively).

Flag Day is a piece inspired by the combination of Picasso's "Les Demoiselles d'Avignon", and Benny Andrews' "Flag Day". In this work, the female is hidden by the bars of the American flag, as seen in Andrews' work, similar to that of a jail cell. The female is nude to show the objectification and the ways of how women are seen in the United States.

I replaced the "Hello My Name Is" labels with money. Changing the connotation associated labels, and replacing it with money.

Your Body's a Landscape. Mesh Form Wire 91.44cm x 60.96cm February 2017

This piece was made to show the beauty of the human body, focusing on the female body. In this piece the female body was made into a landscape. It was inspired by the works of Paul Topen and Nikki Taylor. Taylor and Topen specialize in creating wire art of the human body. Topen shines light through the pieces, revealing more detail. This was used in my piece to reveal a landscape. This combines the industrialized human with the land it lives in. In a sense, the body is the land.

This is Not You Permanent Marker on Mirror 60.9x91.44cm February 2017

This piece was originally made with the inspiration of Rene Magritte's "The Treachery of Images". It uses the same concept of directly telling a viewer that what they are looking at is not the truth. This conveys to the viewer that the person that they are seeing is not really who they are. The viewer is forced to consider an alternate reality, or simply accept that their reflection is not who they appear to be.
